The story of Henrietta Lacks illustrates the racial inequities that are embedded in the US research and health-care systems. Lacks was a Black woman.



<u>Identity</u>: Students will learn about importance of medical consent in their own lives and any discrimination they may have experienced in medical or research offices.

Skill: Students will complete a personal narrative.

<u>Intellect</u>: Students will learn about inhumane experiments on Black bodies and what it means to give *consent*.

<u>Criticality</u>: Students will learn about the racism that caused the inhumanity on Black lives regarded so-called science procedures.

<u>Joy</u>: Students will consider the joy that Black people sought in times of oppression.
